Rosie Angelica Alonso

Rosie Angelica Alonso aka Tauri received her MFA from Cal State University, San Bernardino in creative writing. She is a part of the Los Angeles Poet Society and is the chief editor of Acid Verse Literary Journal. She is a narrative poet who delves into the realms of magical surrealism and indigenous storytelling. She is a daughter of migrant parents and a lover of cats, skateboarding, and food.

Ceasar K. Avelar

Ceasar Avelar is a U.S.-born, Blue-Collar Central American Poet who writes exclusively for the working class. Ceasar is the current Poet Laureate of Pomona, CA. He is the Writer in Residence at Cafe Con Libros Press, and is the Founder and Host of Obsidian Tongues Open Mic. Ceasar is the author of God of the Air Hose and Other Blue Collar Poems, published by El Martillo Press.

Jessica Wilson-Cardenas

Jessica is a 3rd generation Beathik... a Beat Poet from the lines of Jack Spicer to Paul Vangelisti, and the heartbeat of the visual Muse and Master Poet, Maurya Simon. She completed her BA in Creative Writing and Art History from UC Riverside in Riverside, CA, and obtained her Master of Fine Arts from Otts College of Art and Design in Los Angeles, CA.

James Coats

James Coats is a multidisciplinary artist, author, and educator born in Los Angeles and raised in the Inland Empire. As a creative change agent he believes the arts can inspire youth and influence positive change in the world. His first poetry collection If I had Lived was published in 2018. He is the winner of the 2021 San Gabriel Poetry Slam. In 2021 he founded the organization Lift Our Voices Education which hosts an award winning workshop monthly called Be The Change: Social Justice Writing Workshop. He became the Artist in Residence at The Garcia Center for the Arts in 2022. His newest poetry collection Midnight 5 Mad Dreams is published by World Stage Press. Lalli Dana

Her first job out of college, working at the Iowa Arts Council, Lalli Dana Drobny recognized and experienced how utterly essential Arts and the creative process are to humans. She received her MA in Writing from the University of Iowa and has been facilitating contemplative, nuturing workshops where folks can be curious and connect deeper with themselves and each other ever since. Lalli created Writing Our Lives into Being in 2003. In 2020, wanting to mix appropriate doses of joy in ioncreasing levels of widespread despair and isolation, Lalli introduced online Write Now Workshops. Lalli founded KindMind – the heart of well-being in 2002 (kindmind.org). Designed to support and strengthen mind/body/spirit collaboration and right/left brain integration, KindMind blends somatic and mindfulness practices. (She's been teaching Mindfulness at Santa Barbara City College since 2007.) In 2021, Lalli was certified in Resonant Healing and offers time travel, vow release, and emergent ritual constellations.

Lee Herrick

Lee Herrick is the California Poet Laureate. He is the author of three books of poems: Scar and Flower, finalist for the 2020 Northern California Book Award; Gardening Secrets of the Dead; and This Many Miles from Desire.

He is co-editor of The World I Leave You: Asian American Poets on Faith and Spirit (Orison Books 2020). His poems appear widely, in The Poetry Foundation, Academy of American Poets, The Place That Inhabits Us: Poems from the San Francisco Bay Watershed, Indivisible: Poems of Social Justice with a foreword by the Common, HERE: Poems for the Planet, with a foreword by the Dalai Lama, and Dear America: Letters of Hope, Habitat, Defiance, and Democracy, among others. Herrick serves on the advisory board of Terrain.org and Sixteen Rivers Press. He co-founded LitHop in Fresno. He has taught in Qingdao, China, and for Kuncliman.

He was born in Daejeon, Korea, and adopted as an infant. He lives with his family in Fresno, California, and served as Fresno Poet Laureate from 2015-2017. He teaches at Fresno City College and in the low-residency MFA program at University of Nevada Reno at Lake Tahoe. He is the 10th California Poet Laureate, and the first Asian American to serve in the role.

Johnnierenee Nelson

Johnnierenee Nelson

Award-winning writer Johnnierenee Nia Nelson, aka the Kwanzaa Poet, has written five books of Kwanzaa poetry. Her first volume, "A Quest for Kwanzaa", published in 1988, was heralded as the authoritative genesis of Kwanzaa literature. "Classic Kwanzaa Poems: New and Selected" is her latest work. A poet/teacher for both California Poets in the Schools and San Diego's Border Voses Project, as well as a performance poet, Johnnierenee has presented readings and workshops from Cairo, Egypt to Vancouver, British Columbia. Ms. Nelson was featured at the fifth Annual El Cajon Friendhip Festival with her creation "A Taste of Kwanzaa" and on two KPBS shows, "These Days" and "The Lounge." She also performed at San Diego City College in collaboration with Urban Bush Women. Her video credits include the Emmy-Award-winning documentary, "Lighting the Way" and KPBS' acclaimed "Border Voices" IV show. Ms. Nelson is the Poet Laureate of the World Beat Center and the San Diego County Area Coordinator for CalPoets.

Dawn Trook is a Merced-based performer, writer, theater producer, and educator. She serves as an Area Coordinator for California Poets in the Schools and teaches writing at UC Merced. Trook is a recipient of a California Arts Council Heartland Creative Corps grant and will spend the next writing, creating, and performing a one-woman show where she plays water in the last stages of battle with human development. Though her writing has been printed in some publications, Trook focuses on non-traditional methods of poetry distribution. She writes poetry on demand through her initiative bespoke. She uses a pink manual Smith-Corona to do this.

Michael Willard holds a Ph.D. in American Studies from the University of Minnesota. His teaching, research, and publications focus on popular/youth culture and racial formation in Los Angeles of the past and present. He co-edited Generations of Youth: Youth Cultures and History and Sports Matters: Race, Recreation, and Culture. His articles have appeared in American Quarterly and edited collections on popular culture and American cultural history.

This poet has the girl for tonly fusing her teaching expertise and poetic talents, but her Level 1 Kundalini Yoga Teacher training as well to facilitate unique poetry workshops in English, Spanish, and/or a fusion of both for participants of all ages and demographics.

Stacie is an award-winning vocalist, speaker, and music psychotherapist with over 15 years of experience in mental health treatment.
